

Successful CROP Hunger Walk Raises Over \$6,400 for Local and Global Impact

Glen Burnie, MD – Under the dedicated leadership of Paul Shaffer, this year's CROP Hunger Walk brought together 21 walkers from four participating churches: Glen Burnie UMC, Linthicum Heights UMC, Messiah UMC, and NCCP. Their collective efforts raised an impressive \$3,431, with an additional \$1,490 contributed online, bringing the total to \$6,411.

Of this total, \$1,602.75 was allocated to the North County Emergency Outreach Network (NCEON), supporting their vital work in addressing food insecurity and emergency needs in the community. The remaining funds will aid global hunger relief through Church World Service programs, emphasizing sustainable solutions to poverty and hunger.

Glen Burnie UMC Sets 2025 Mission Budget to Impact Lives Locally and Globally




Glen Burnie, MD - The Glen Burnie UMC Mission
